

Chest Pain History Checklist

Opening the Consultation (Patient's profile) (Score: 1/10)

- 1. Introduction: Introduce yourself and your role.
- 2. Consent: Explain the purpose of the history taking and obtain consent.
- 3. **Patient's Profile**: Take the necessary information from the patient such as his where he lives, Martial status & Occupation.

Presenting Complaint (Score: 1/10)

4. **Open Question**: Ask the patient to describe their chest pain in their own words.

History of Presenting Complaint (Score: 4/10) (SOCRATES)

- 5. **Site**: Ask where the pain is located.
- 6. **Onset**: Clarify when the pain started and whether it was sudden or gradual.
- 7. **Character**: Ask the patient to describe the nature of the pain (e.g., sharp, dull, crushing).
- 8. **Radiation**: Inquire if the pain radiates to other areas (e.g., arm, jaw, back).
- 9. **Associated Symptoms**: Ask about symptoms like shortness of breath, sweating, nausea, or palpitations.
- 10. **Timing**: Determine the duration and pattern of the pain (e.g., constant, intermittent).
- 11. **Exacerbating/Relieving Factors**: Ask what makes the pain worse or better (e.g., exertion, rest, medications).
- 12. **Severity**: Use a scale of 0-10 to gauge the intensity of the pain.

Systemic Enquiry (Review) (Score: 1/10)

- 13. **Cardiovascular**: Ask about other cardiovascular symptoms (e.g., palpitations, syncope).
- 14. **Respiratory**: Inquire about respiratory symptoms (e.g., cough, wheezing).
- 15. **Gastrointestinal**: Ask about gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g., reflux, dysphagia).
- 16. **Musculoskeletal**: Inquire about any musculoskeletal issues (e.g., recent trauma, tenderness).

Past Medical History (Score: 1/10)

- 17. **Cardiovascular Diseases**: Screen for conditions like hypertension, coronary artery disease, or previous myocardial infarctions.
- 18. Other Relevant Conditions: Ask about diabetes, hyperlipidemia, or other chronic illnesses.
- 19. Surgical History: Inquire about any past surgeries, especially cardiac or thoracic.
